The Western and Scriptural Models of Spirituality: God, Self and Rational Consciousness

Forsake everything that is yours. Undertake this, and let it cost you everything you can afford. There you will find true peace, and nowhere else. ... In Scriptural spirituality we are to become a sacrament of the presence of God

In the last several hundred years priests have rarely been taught about the contemplative dimension of the Gospel or the Christian mystical tradition. The most they could usually find in a university or a seminary was the history of Christian spirituality.

The Western Model of God-outside-of-self describes a relationship that is at odds with the Gospel teaching. Until the beginning of the Second Vatican Council we rarely heard the doctrine that we are in God and that God is in us.

Here are some of the symptoms of the Western Model of Spirituality: We initiate our good efforts and God rewards. Thus, we have an image of God sitting in the bleachers of an arena watching our activities. If they are good, it's thumbs up! If they are not, it's thumbs down.

In the Scriptural Model, grace is present not only in the sacraments in a special way, but inspires our good actions. In the Western Model, we do all the work even though influenced by reflections on Scripture. There is, however, a deep psychological distrust of ourselves. We are just too "bad" and unworthy of God's love for us.

Those who follow the Western Model have no idea what the mystics are talking about, or why people practice methods of meditation to cultivate interior silence and to experience the presence of the Ultimate Reality everywhere and in everything, including ourselves.

If our consciousness is growing, conflicts are resolved, not on the rational level, the level of opposites and duality, but on the non-dual level. Apparent disasters and contradictions are perceived as invitations to move to a higher level of consciousness. There the two are resolved in the light of a higher perspective where they are not contradictory, but complimentary.
